Aperture	f/8 – f/16	Balances depth of field and sharpness
Shutter Speed	1/200s or faster	Freezes motion and reduces camera shake
ISO	100 – 400	Keeps image noise low

Setting	Recommended Value	Why It Matters
Focus Mode	Manual Focus	Gives you precise control
Drive Mode	Continuous / Burst	Helps capture the perfect moment

 **Pro Tip:** Start with aperture priority mode (A or Av) at f/8, then adjust based on your results. This lets you focus on composition while learning how depth of field works.

How to Take Sharp Macro Photos

Blurry macro photos are the #1 frustration for beginners. Here's **how to take sharp macro photos** every time:

- **Stabilize your camera** – Use a tripod, monopod, or a beanbag for support.
- **Use a fast shutter speed** – 1/200s or faster to freeze motion.
- **Focus on the eyes** – Sharp eyes draw the viewer in.
- **Use focus peaking** – Many cameras show you exactly what's in focus.
- **Take multiple shots** – Adjust focus slightly between frames.
- **Try focus stacking** – Combine multiple images for greater depth of field.

✓ **Remember:** Even a tiny movement is magnified in macro. If you're shooting handheld, brace your arms against your body and breathe slowly.
